# 1 For your safety

## 1.1 Authorised personnel

All operations described in this documentation must be carried out only by trained, qualified personnel authorised by the plant operator.

During work on and with the device, the required personal protective equipment must always be worn.

# 1.2 Appropriate use

VEGAPULS 67 is a sensor for continuous level measurement.

You can find detailed information about the area of application in chapter "*Product description*".

Operational reliability is ensured only if the instrument is properly used according to the specifications in the operating instructions manual as well as possible supplementary instructions.

# 1.3 Warning about incorrect use

Inappropriate or incorrect use of this product can give rise to application-specific hazards, e.g. vessel overfill through incorrect mounting or adjustment. Damage to property and persons or environmental contamination can result. Also, the protective characteristics of the instrument can be impaired.

# 1.4 General safety instructions

This is a state-of-the-art instrument complying with all prevailing regulations and directives. The instrument must only be operated in a technically flawless and reliable condition. The operator is responsible for the trouble-free operation of the instrument. When measuring aggressive or corrosive media that can cause a dangerous situation if the instrument malfunctions, the operator has to implement suitable measures to make sure the instrument is functioning properly.

The safety instructions in this operating instructions manual, the national installation standards as well as the valid safety regulations and accident prevention rules must be observed by the user.

For safety and warranty reasons, any invasive work on the device beyond that described in the operating instructions manual may be carried out only by personnel authorised by the manufacturer. Arbitrary conversions or modifications are explicitly forbidden. For safety reasons, only the accessory specified by the manufacturer must be used.

To avoid any danger, the safety approval markings and safety tips on the device must also be observed.

The low transmitting power of the radar sensor is far below the internationally approved limits. No health impairments are to be expected with intended use. The band range of the measuring frequency can be found in chapter "*Technical data*".



# 1.5 EU conformity

#### Electromagnetic compatibility

Instruments in four-wire or Ex-d-ia version are designed for use in an industrial environment. Nevertheless, electromagnetic interference from electrical conductors and radiated emissions must be taken into account, as is usual with class A instruments according to EN 61326-1. If the instrument is used in a different environment, the electromagnetic compatibility to other instruments must be ensured by suitable measures.

## 1.6 NAMUR recommendations

NAMUR is the automation technology user association in the process industry in Germany. The published NAMUR recommendations are accepted as the standard in field instrumentation.

It is hence approved for use inside closed vessels in countries of the EU.

Use is also approved in EFTA countries, provided the respective standards have been implemented.

For operation inside of closed vessels, points a to f in annex E of EN 302372 must be fulfilled.

# 3 Mounting

# 3.1 Collar or adapter flange

For mounting the instrument on a nozzle, a combi compression flange for DN 80 (ASME 3" or JIS 80) is also available for retrofitting. Optionally, the instrument can be also equipped with an adapter flange from DN 100 (ASME 4" or JIS 100).

With the housing versions plastic, aluminium single chamber and stainless steel, the collar flange can be placed directly over the housing. With the aluminium double chamber housing, retroactive mounting in this way is not possible - the mounting type must be specified with the order.

You can find drawings of these mounting options in chapter " *Dimensions*".




Fig. 2: Flange mounting of the radar sensor

# 3.2 Mounting strap

The mounting strap enables simple mounting on the vessel wall or silo top. It is suitable for wall, ceiling or boom mounting. Especially in open vessels this is a very easy and effective way to align the sensor to the bulk solid surface.

Mounting strap






Fig. 3: Radar sensor with mounting strap

The strap is supplied unassembled and must be screwed to the sensor before setup with three hexagon socket screws M5 x 10 and spring washers. Max. torque, see chapter "*Technical data*". Required tools: Allen wrench size 4.

There are two ways to screw the strap onto the sensor. Depending on the selected version, the sensors can be swivelled in the strap as follows:

- Single chamber housing
  - Angle of inclination 180°, infinitely variable
  - Angle of inclination in three steps  $0^\circ$ ,  $90^\circ$  and  $180^\circ$
- Double chamber housing
  - Angle of inclination 90°, infinitely variable
  - Angle of inclination in two steps 0° and 90°




Fig. 4: Adjustment of the angle of inclination






Fig. 5: Turning by fastening in the centre

# 3.3 Mounting instructions

1. Distance from the vessel wall > 200 mm




Fig. 6: Distance of the antenna to the vessel wall/socket configuration

2. Keep the nozzle short, round off the nozzle end

# 4 Connecting to power supply

#### 4.1 Connecting

**Connection technology** 

The voltage supply and signal output are connected via the springloaded terminals in the housing.

Connection to the display and adjustment module or to the interface adapter is carried out via contact pins in the housing.

# Information: The terminal b

The terminal block is pluggable and can be removed from the electronics. To do this, lift the terminal block with a small screwdriver and pull it out. When reinserting the terminal block, you should hear it snap in.

**Connection procedure** 

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Unscrew the housing lid
- 2. Loosen compression nut of the cable gland and remove blind plug
- Remove approx. 10 cm (4 in) of the cable mantle (signal output), strip approx. 1 cm (0.4 in) insulation from the ends of the individual wires
- 4. Insert the cable into the sensor through the cable entry

5. Insert the wire ends into the terminals according to the wiring plan

#### Information:

Solid cores as well as flexible cores with wire end sleeves are inserted directly into the terminal openings. In case of flexible cores without end sleeves, press the terminal from above with a small screwdriver, the terminal opening is then free. When the screwdriver is released, the terminal closes again.

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- 6. Check the hold of the wires in the terminals by lightly pulling on them
- Connect the cable screening to the internal ground terminal, connect the outer ground terminal to potential equalisation in case of power supply via low voltage
- Connect the lead cable for voltage supply in the same way according to the wiring plan, in addition connect the ground conductor to the inner ground terminal when powered with mains voltage.
- 9. Tighten the compression nut of the cable entry gland. The seal ring must completely encircle the cable
- 10. Screw the housing lid back on

The electrical connection is finished.

#### Information:

The terminal blocks are pluggable and can be removed from the housing insert. To do this, lift the terminal block with a small screwdriver and pull it out. When inserting the terminal block again, you should hear it snap in.

# 4.2 Wiring plan, double chamber housing



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The following illustrations apply to the non-Ex as well as to the Ex-d-ia version.





Fig. 8: Connection compartment with double chamber housing with mains voltage




Fig. 9: Connection compartment with double chamber housing with low voltage

# 5 Set up with the display and adjustment module

## 5.1 Insert display and adjustment module

The display and adjustment module can be inserted into the sensor and removed again at any time. You can choose any one of four different positions - each displaced by 90°. It is not necessary to interrupt the power supply.

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Unscrew the housing lid
- 2. Place the display and adjustment module on the electronics in the desired position and turn it to the right until it snaps in.
- 3. Screw housing lid with inspection window tightly back on

Disassembly is carried out in reverse order.

The display and adjustment module is powered by the sensor, an additional connection is not necessary.

#### Note:

If you intend to retrofit the instrument with a display and adjustment module for continuous measured value indication, a higher lid with an inspection glass is required.

#### 5.2 Parameter adjustment

Set parameters

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1. Go to the menu " Setup" via the display and adjustment module.




 Select in the menu item " Medium" the medium of your application, for example " Gravel/Pebble".



3. Select in the menu item " *Application*" the vessel, the application and the vessel form, for example, silo.



 Carry out the adjustment in the menu items " Min. adjustment" and " Max. adjustment".



**Parameterization example** The radar sensor measures the distance from the sensor to the medium surface. For indication of the real level, an allocation of the measured distance to the percentage height must be carried out.




Fig. 11: Parameterization example

- 1 Min. level ≙ max. meas. distance
- 2 Max. level ≙ min. meas. distance

For this adjustment, the distance is entered when the vessel is full and nearly empty. If these values are not known, an adjustment with other distances, for example, 10 % and 90 % is also possible. Starting point for these distance specifications is always the seal surface of the thread or flange.

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Diagnostics - Echo curve memory The function " *Echo curve memory*" makes it possible to save the echo curve at the time of setup. This is generally recommended, and it is absolutely necessary if you want to use the Asset Management functions. If possible, the curve should be saved with a low level in the vessel.

> With the adjustment software PACTware and a PC, a high resolution echo curve can be displayed and used to recognize signal changes during operation. In addition, the echo curve of setup can be displayed in the echo curve window and compared with the current echo curve.



Additional settings - False The following circumstances cause interfering reflections and can influence the measurement:

- High mounting nozzles
- Vessel internals such as struts
- Agitators
- Buildup or welded joints on vessel walls
- Note:

A false signal suppression detects, marks and saves these false signals to ensure that they are ignored in the level measurement.

This should be done with the lowest possible level so that all potential interfering reflections can be detected.

Proceed as follows:

 Select with [->] the menu item " False signal suppression" and confirm with [OK].

- Confirm 3-times with [OK] and enter the actual distance from the sensor to the product surface.
- 3. All interfering signals in this range are detected by the sensor and stored after being confirmed with *[OK]*.



• Note: Check

Check the distance to the medium surface, because if an incorrect (too large) value is entered, the existing level will be saved as a false signal. The level would then no longer be detectable in this area.

If a false signal suppression has already been saved in the sensor, the following menu window appears when selecting " *False signal suppression*":



**Delete:** An already created false signal suppression will be completely deleted. This is useful if the saved false signal suppression no longer matches the metrological conditions in the vessel.

**Extend**: is used to extend an already created false signal suppression. This is useful if a false signal suppression was carried out with too high a level and not all false signals could be detected. When selecting "*Extend*", the distance to the medium surface of the created false signal suppression is displayed. This value can now be changed and the false signal suppression can be extended to this range.

# 6 Set up with smartphone/tablet, PC/ notebook via Bluetooth

#### 6.1 Preparations

Make sure that the Bluetooth function of the display and adjustment module is activated. For this, the switch on the bottom side must be set to "On".




Fig. 12: Activate Bluetooth

Change sensor PIN


The security concept of Bluetooth operation absolutely requires that the default setting of the sensor PIN be changed. This prevents unauthorized access to the sensor.

The default setting of the sensor PIN is " **0000**". First of all you have to change the sensor PIN in the adjustment menu of the sensor, e.g. to " **1111**":

1. In the adjustment menu, go to " Additional adjustments", " PIN"

#### Note:

The menu item " *PIN*" is only displayed if in the menu " *Setup*", " *Lock/ Unlock adjustment*" the adjustment is released.



Activate Bluetooth

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i	Note: Bluetooth access can only be established if the current sensor PIN differs from the default setting " 0000". It is possible both when the PIN is deactivated and when it is activated (adjustment menu " Setup", " Lock/Unlock adjustment").
	6.2 Connecting
Preparations	Smartphone/Tablet Start the adjustment app and select the function "Setup". The smart- phone/tablet searches automatically for Bluetooth-capable instru- ments in the area.
	<b>PC/Notebook</b> Start PACTware and the VEGA project assistant. Select the device search via Bluetooth and start the search function. The device auto- matically searches for Bluetooth-capable devices in the vicinity.
Connecting	The message " <i>Instrument search running</i> " is displayed. All devices found are listed in the operating window. The search is automatically continued continuously.
	Select in the device list the requested device. The message " <i>Connecting</i> " is displayed.
Authenticate	For the first connection, the operating device and the sensor must authenticate each other. After successful authentication, the next con- nection functions without authentication.
	For authentication, enter in the next menu window the 4-digit sensor PIN.
	6.3 Sensor parameter adjustment
	The sensor parameterization is carried out via the adjustment app on the smartphone/tablet or the DTM on the PC/notebook.
